PHY 605 and PHY 480 SYLLABUS, FALL 2023

- COURSE OVERVIEW. We will study linear vector spaces and elements of partial differential equations at a level suitable for first year graduate/advanced undergraduate students. A familiarity with linear algebra and ordinary differential equations (at the level of MATH 221 and MATH 225 taught at UMBC) is expected. More specifically, we will try to cover most or all of the following material:
- Topics. Linear vector spaces, inner produce spaces, orthonormal bases, infinite dimensions, Dirac notation. Operators, matrices, and determinants. Integral and differential operators, eighenvalues and eighenvectors, subspaces, row and column subspaces. Eigenfunction methods for differential equations, Sturm-Liouville theory, partial differential equations and their classes, integral transform methods, inhomogeneous problems with Green's functions.
- Resources. We will rely on the notes that I will provide, . These notes are based on the recommended books "Mathematical Methods for Physics and Engineering" by K.F Riley, M. P. Hobson, S. J. Bence (3rd edition, Cambridge University Press, ISBN 0-521-67971-0 and "Linear algebra done right" by Sheldon Axler, springer, Second edition, ISBN 0-387-98258-2. A very good book for reviewing Linear Algebra is that by Strung (see also his MIT online lectures). The blackboard web page will be the announcement board of the course, where notes, homework, and announcements will be posted. You are expected to always be familiar with its content.

- <u>Grading.</u> Homework (30%): Homework questions will provide good practice for the types of question likely to be posed in the mid term and final exams. A homework will be assigned every week, except for the week leading to the mid term exam. Students are expected to solve all the problems of the homework but are not required to turn them in. In the end of the class on the due-day of the homework, students will be

given 10 min to clearly reproduce the solution of one or more of the homework problems selected by me.

- Mid Term (30%): It will cover the material from the beginning of the class up to the lecture before the mid term. The time of the mid term will be announced in class at least a week in advance.
- Final Exam (40%): An exam at the end of the course on all the course material.
- Grading Scale: A: 85-100, B: 70-84, C: 60-69, D: 50-59, F: Below 50.
- IMPORTANT NOTE: Clear handwriting, proper English grammar and syntax, as well as logical flow of your arguments and no missing steps are required in all exams and homework.
